

Digital Immigrants vs Digital Natives

The 20th and 21st century brought us great advancement in technology and science that it sparked what one would call a Digital Revolution. This marks the beginning of the Information Age where widespread of digital logic circuits and its derived technologies such as computer and digital cellular phones affect the lives of the majority of the human race.

There is a transitional divide between the Digital Immigrants and the Digital Natives. The Digital Immigrants are individuals who were born before the existence of digital technology and adopted it later in their life, usually before the 1980s. The Digital Natives are individuals who are born during or after the introduction of technology.

As technology is an integral part of the Digital Natives' lives, they tend to think and process information fundamentally different from their predecessors. Digital Natives, having spent their entire lives




surrounded by technology results in them being the 'native speakers' of the digital language.

Both terms coined back in 2001 by Marc Presnky indicated that an individual's thinking pattern change depending on his/her experience. The thinking is affected by the culture and environment he/she grows up in. This will therefore result in both the Digital Immigrants' and Natives' to think and do things differently; hence causing the divide.

So what problems will the divide cause?

The Digital Divide: Language Barrier or Generation Gap?

For those of us who remember a life before the Internet or even CD players, this gives us an opportunity to question how immersed we are in the digital landscape. If you prefer to print articles from the Internet to read them, or phone people to see if they received an email you sent – you probably have a 'thick accent', and would be considered by Digital Natives to be a foreigner. This can raise some interesting and important questions, because we are not simply discussing a generation gap, or the digital divide. We are discussing a different way of thinking.

A university professor who insists on reading from typed papers for forty-five minutes is unlikely to get his message across very effectively to students who are used to browsing and streaming and quickly accessing information with a few clicks of a mouse. Likewise, a teacher who is not used to online tools such as social media chan-

nels and chatrooms is unlikely to be able to always communicate with her students when she consistently misinterprets LOL as "lots of luck".

A digital divide may not only exists across countries and between a student and a teacher. A more pressing concern is the communication gap between parents and children due to the prevalent use of Internet and other technology tools. This causes concerns such as the breakdown in communication, technological anxiety as well as the lack of awareness to the dangers that technology might bring.

Bridging the Digital Divide

One simple step towards bridging the divide is to develop an interest and understanding in technology and be proficient in the 'language' that the Digital Natives are speaking. To do so, you can start with the following:

Embrace Technology as an Empowering Tool

Popularity of technology tools such as 3G/4G smartphones, iPads and netbooks have evolved whereby they are now commonly available and used by the masses. Various government intiatives are already in place to foster the use of technology and innovation to make education more engaging. The pervasive use of technology are also embedded into the corporate landscape to help streamline processes. Technology will always continue to play a key role in our lives and as Digital Immigrants, we have to be motivated to "keep up" with the fast-moving innovations that are coming from different directions. By embracing the digital wave, we are taking the first step to reducing the chasm.

Use Online Communication Tools to Interact

Web 2.0 tools such as blogs, wikis, videos and games are common platforms that are simple and yet effective modes of interaction between the Digital Immigrants and Digital Natives. They are very informative and allow facilitation of communication and collaboration between these two digital generations.

Social media tools such as Facebook are also no longer

used only by youths as a platform to express themselves. Businesses can foster customer engagement and improve relationships through these channels as well. Families can also stay connected online via these social media tools

Adopt Cyber Wellness Values

Promoting a safe and responsible use of technology and internet is critical to avoid the pitfalls of a digital revolution. For example, being a "good" digital citizen includes taking precautions against being vulnerable to scams, cyber bullying and other dangers. Parents should play an active role in a child's online activity. The conversations that make kids good digital citizens are technology; they're about the communicating your values as a parent. Teaching your kids to treat others as how they would like to be treated online is the key. There are various workshops and online sites that can help to start those vou conversations—even if you think your kids are more tech-savvy than you are.

In short, Digital Immigrants have to learn to be amazingly adaptable to the technological change. Digital Natives however, while unlikely to go backward, should accept that traditional methods do not always mean ineffective. Cultural assimilation between Digital Natives and Immigrants can occur through a mutual process of adaptation rather than a one-way street.
